Subject Spotlight -Science

The vision of the Science Faculty is that pupils of all ages and abilites will enjoy studying Science subjects, set high expectations for themselves and achieve at the highest level possible for them as an individual. Pupils studying within the Science faculty are supported to deepen their scientific knowledge, develop their curiosity, improve their awareness of career opportunities linked to STEM subjects and develop skills which will prepare them for life beyond school.

The Science faculty staff would like to congratulate last year's S4-S6 pupils on their fantastic performance in the 2019 exams.

Our highlights include:

167 National 5 qualifications were achieved by S4 pupils in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Lab Science and Health Sector.

95 Higher qualifications were achieved by S5 pupils in Biology, Higher Human Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

23 Advanced Higher qualifications were achieved by S6 pupils in Biology, Physics and Chemistry.

The bar has been set extremely high for this year, and we hope that this inspires our new S4-S6 pupils to work hard and stay motivated to achieve their goals this session. Study support will begin in October and we'd urge as many pupils as possible to attend these sessions to support their learning in class and home study.



Gallery of Learning - S2 STEM

In this article we will explore the disasters connected to radiation such as nuclear winter.

Nuclear fallout

Nuclear fallout is the event that happens after a nuclear blast has occurred. It contains radioactive ash and dust which can become trapped in the atmosphere. The fallout can mix with rain clouds to form a pyro cumulus which is dark black rain, darkened by soot. Also the radioactive dust is made of fission products and bystanding atoms. **Nuclear winter**

Nuclear winter is the severe and prolonged global climatic effect hypothesized to occur after widespread firestorms following a nuclear war. The hypothesis is based on the fact that such fires can inject soot into the stratosphere where it can block out sunlight from reaching the surface of the earth.

The nuclear winter scenario assumes 100 or more city firestorms get ignited by nuclear explosions and the firestorms lift a lot of sooty smoke into the upper troposphere. This lack of light would cause global cooling and harm to plant life.

Solar flare

A solar flare is a sudden flash of increased brightness on the sun, usually observed near its surface and in close proximity to a sunspot. Powerful flares are often, but not always, accompanied by a coronal mass ejection. This is where the material that makes up the sun is thrown off into space. Flares are closely associated with ejection of plasma and particles through the suns corona into outer space, flares also emit radio waves. If the ejection is in the direction of earth, particles can penetrate the Earth's ionosphere, and may even disrupt long range communication. High-energy particles from these flares can arrive almost simultaneously with electromagnetic radiation which destroys electronic equipment such as phones and radios.

23rd Sunday of the Year - Year C



Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem. He knew that suffering, rejection and death awaited him at the end of that journey. But it seems that some Galileans regarded it as a victory march of the Messiah. In no uncertain terms Jesus disillusioned them

Knowing that his disciples would

have to face a similar challenge, Jesus spoke about the cost of discipleship. He didn't literally mean hating one's father and mother. The word 'hate' is a Semitic expression. 'Love less' would be nearer to what Jesus had in mind. He was telling his disciples that they must be ready, if needs be, to sacrifice the dearest things in life. In certain (rare) circumstances they might have to choose between him and their own close relatives.

The two short parables make the point that discipleship is a serious calling. It could mean persecution and even death. In this, as in any other sphere of life (such as business and politics), one shouldn't walk into it blindly. One must calculate the cost before setting out and see if one has what it takes.

Last Sunday – 1st September – was named by Pope Francis as **'World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation'**. Many parishes are now devoting all of September to reflecting on our care for the planet and its resources. resources – the Amazon Rainforest. Pope Francis has now entered the political debate and is pleading for politicians and world leaders to end the wilful destruction of our precious environment. Day after day it seems we see human beings behaving in the worst of ways towards the natural environment we have been gifted with. It appears it is driven often by the insatiable human need for economic profit ... money. I think it's a very, very serious sin ... And we are ALL responsible.

Perhaps we can't do so much directly about the Amazon Rainforest here in Livingston but I feel sure we can all do our wee bit to care for what we have here in West Lothian. I'm sure I've said before that I love gardening! And I do my little bit to care for the natural environment I'm gifted with here at St Peter's. And now, each year, children from St Margaret's Academy also come to clear out pots and planters and prepare bulbs for the Spring to make the area around the parish beautiful for everyone. I no longer kill spiders or wasps or pesky houseflies. I catch them and set them free.

There is a child who is now leading the world in responding to caring for the environment – she is a remarkable 16 year-old young person from Sweden called Greta Thunberg. She is literally fulfilling the words of an ancient prophecy of Prophet Isaiah ... 'and a little child shall lead them'. Let's be like her! Let's encourage our children to love the planet and creation as the incredible gift that it is TO US!

On Friday morning the following words were prayed at St Margaret's Academy over the tannoy system. Maybe you'd like to make the words your own as we think about our response as to how we care for creation

All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures. You embrace with your tenderness all that exists. Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with peace, that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one. O God of the poor help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth. Teach us to discover the worth of each thing, to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognise that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light. WIADOMOŚCI POLSKIEJ WSPÓLNOTY W LIVINSTON



Dzisiejsza Liturgia słowa pełna jest paradoksów. Spójrzmy na pierwsze czytanie, z Księgi Mądrości: "Któż poznał Twój zamysł, gdy nie dałeś Mądrości, nie zesłałeś z wysoka Świętego Ducha swego?" (por. Mdr 9, 17). A następnie "... a ludzie poznali co Tobie miłe", ale, pytamy, w jaki sposób?

W Psalmie 90 znajdujemy takie słowa: "Obracasz w proch człowieka". A następnie "…wracajcie, synowie ludzcy". Co by to mogło znaczyć ?

Nareszcie w dzisiejszym fragmencie Ewangelii najbardziej zaskakujące są pierwsze i ostatnie zdanie. Pierwsze mówi o rzekomej nienawiści do ojca i matki, żony i dzieci, braci i sióstr, nadto siebie samego. Ostatnie zaś brzmi jako konkluzja: "Tak więc nikt z was, jeśli nie wyrzeka się wszystkiego, co posiada, nie może być moim uczniem". O czym tu mowa ?

Wśród różnorodnych interpretacji i komentarzy tych fragmentów Ewangelii trudno znaleźć jednoznaczną odpowiedź, ale jedno jest pewne. Mamy odczytywać tę Liturgię słowa w całości, a zwłaszcza Ewangelię. Ponieważ tam gdzie Chrystus mówi o tzw. nienawiści dodaje również słowa o krzyżu. Opuszczenie najbliższych dla Chrystusa, dla Jego Ewangelii nieuchronnie wiąże się z krzyżem. Ten właśnie krzyż nadal pozostają znakiem zgorszenia i nienawiści. Pamiętajmy jednak, że krzyż jest etapem przejściowym. W swoim codziennym życiu niejednokrotnie spotykamy się z trudnościami, ale jeżeli mamy w pamięci, iż ten krzyż kryje w sobie potęgę zmartwychwstania, to żadna nienawiść, żadne trudności i niepowodzenia nie zdołają przyćmić radość zmartwychwstania!

W tym kluczu należy odczytywać również ostanie zdanie z dzisiejszej Ewangelii: być uczniem Jezusa, to znaczy przejść swoje życie Jego śladami.
